Summary of Activity

- April 11, 2022 presentation to SPC
- April 20, 2022 presentation to TAC
 - Ran out of time to finish and was invited to return at a future date
- June 8, 2022 completed presentation to TAC
 - > TAC concurred, in general, with the plan for a RM support service
 - The TAC also agreed that we should consider updates to the project lifecycle to encourage strong RM planning
- Mid-June mid-Aug training deck development
- > Aug 24, 2022 Initial training session with the L3AF team
- Aug 31, 2022 Second training session with the L3AF team
- > Sept 20, 2022 Proposed that Anuket transition to community release management
- > Sept 20, 2022 Follow up meeting with L3AF team (smaller group) to discuss next steps
 - > L3AF concluded that they would need to defer RM process development to IQ23



Release Management Training Document

Learnings from L3AF Training

- Having the right audience for the training is key
 - > The audience for the L3AF training was the TSC, many of whom weren't interested in receiving the full training
 - The training should be given primarily to the community release managers, while leaving it open to other interested community members
- We should have an introductory presentation to the community TSC that explains what we're doing before we launch into the full training presentation
- We should have a commitment from the TSC to move forward with Release Management Support Service, including the identification of release managers, and the approval of a RM working group with a weekly meeting, before we launch into the training



Proposed Approach to Communities

- 1. TCA or PM brings up Release Management Support Service (RMSS) with community TSC.
 - a. If they show interest, then schedule an RMSS introduction presentation
- 2. RMSS Introduction Presentation and discussion (~ 20 mins)
- Schedule TSC discussion / vote
- 4. TSC vote:
 - a. Approve proceeding with RMSS as described in presentation
 - b. Commit to identifying community release managers (2+)
 - c. Approve RM working group and schedule weekly meeting for development of release process
- 5. Once community release managers are identified, schedule three 50-minute training sessions



Release Management Support for ONAP and Anuket

ONAP

Following internal discussions, we concluded that the complexity and level of effort required for ONAP release management does not make it a good candidate for transitioning to community release management at this time

Anuket

- Presented proposal to Anuket to switch to community release management on Sept
 20
- > Anuket team had already discussed this idea as part of their budget discussions
- Anuket will transition in the next week or two



Next Steps

- Develop RMSS introduction presentation
- Discuss additional training targets with Casey and other TCAs
- Re-visit project lifecycle updates with TAC
- > Support Anuket through transition to community release management support.
- Follow up with L3AF in January
